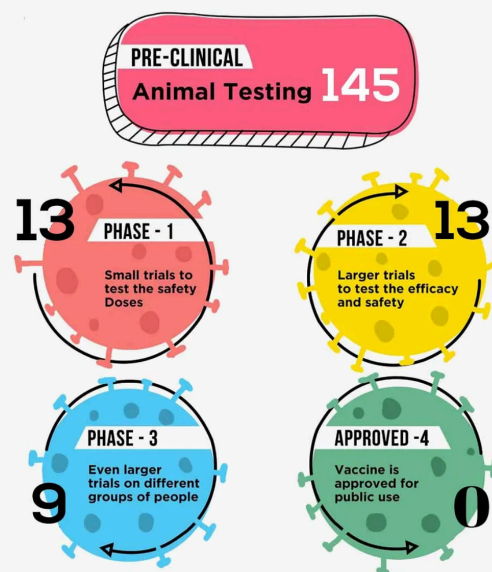

Covid-19 Vaccines Explained

“A Great Day for Science and Humanity”

With every second, an American contracts Covid-19. At this present moment, the world has just hit 50 million confirmed Covid-19 cases with over 1 million deaths. Last Monday, pharmaceutical giant and Fortune 500 corporation Pfizer Inc. and German biotechnology company BioNTech SE released data that demonstrated a Covid-19 vaccine is on the path of transforming this world. Their clinical trial enrolled 43,538 participants and investigated 94 infections so far, suggesting the shots may be 90% effective at preventing Covid-19. Dr. Albert Bourla, Pfizer Inc.’s CEO, called the results “a great day for science and humanity”.

Apart from its contemporary equivalents, the Covid-19 vaccine not only requires two consecutive shots, but brings the new technique of regulating messenger RNA and stopping the propagation of viruses. Unlike cells, viruses infect a cell’s ribosomes—the cellular machinery for protein production—rather than going through mitosis or meiosis. Covid-19 is no different in this viral replication process. A special feature of mRNA, its complete lack of viruses reassured scientists to make possible an immune response protecting the host without giving way to virus propagation.

Anthony Fauci, Director of the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases, suggested that the effectiveness is extraordinary and beyond expectations, and is likely to “have a major impact on everything one does with respect to Covid-19”. The developers have estimated that 50 million doses of the vaccine could be available, covering over 25 million people around the world by the end of 2020.
